We were saddened by the loss of our school's namesake, Akira Toki. Mr. Toki died at the age of 96 on June 29th. The school was renamed in his honor in July, 1993. For those of you fortunate enough who had the opportunity to meet and talk with Mr. Toki, you know what a gentle, kind person his was. American Japanese: Akira Toki, an American Patriot by Arthur C. Rathburn. He was an amazing person with a wonderful story to tell and I look forward to sharing his story with the Toki Community in the future.

As we leave summer behind and begin a new school year, there is plenty of excitement. As a principal, one of my favorite days is the 1^{st;} to watch students return to school filled with excitement and energy. A few days before the start of school, we welcomed our faculty and spent time in the final preparation for a new school year. It is great to have everyone back in school.

We are off to a solid start with approximately 530 students, 75 staff members and lots of Toki Dragon spirit. Each year we identify a theme which describes our goals. This year our theme is "We are Crew, not passengers." As a school, we will spend the year focused on the following:

Assessments: we will continue with Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) for 6th and 7th grade students and MAP and Explore Assessments for 8th grade students.

Crew is a daily structure for developing relationships so that every student has at least one trusted in-school adult. Crew lessons follow specific protocols and focus on relationships, literacy, service, adventure and fitness, and post-secondary opportunities.

Expeditions are ways to examine, process and problem-solve issues in our students' communities. Social studies, science, math, reading and writing use case studies, fieldwork and projects based on these issues and problems to bring learning

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alive for students. This allows students to see the connection between what they are learning to the real world and gives them a venue's to impact their community.

Communication is essential to a successful school. Our monthly newsletter, *Toki Times*, is going green and will be emailed to families. *Dragon Tales* is a weekly email updating families about school-wide events. Each team will send a weekly bulletin, via Infinite Campus Messenger, informing families about what their child is doing at school. Also, be sure to check out grade-level display cases in the foyer of the school for student work and updates.

Construction and building improvements is an ongoing process, especially for a building, like ours, constructed in 1958. This year the Toki/ORE campus received new boilers and bathroom sinks, and more visibly our new elevators, one each for Toki and Orchard Ridge. Their projected completion is January 2013.

We believe it takes a community to raise a school. It takes a school to build a community. We appreciate the support that you have provided to our school over the years. NRTs have an important mission: to help combine and coordinate the strength of City Departments with neighborhood stakeholders to improve the quality of life for Madison residents. NRTs help ensure that City programs and services are responsive to and reflect the aspirations and values of the neighborhood. The goal is to have a self-sustaining community where opportunities exist and needs are met.

This summer, Meadowood residents might have seen or visited with Balsam-Russett NRT members as they toured the area. NRT members have also attended the January, April, and August Meadowood Community Suppers. Please get to know your NRT members, and share your experience as a Meadowood resident!

This summer, the NRT divided into 5 subgroups to represent issues identified at the January community supper, including safety, housing, economic development, youth programming, and neighborhood beautification. Hello Meadowood Neighbors!



The Dane County Board has finished its summer "recess," having met only once in July and August. We will be turning our attention to the 2013 budget. There will be upcoming hearings on the Human Services budget requests on Wednesday September 12 and 19 at the Alliant Energy Center, starting at 6:00 PM each night. The remainder of the

departments' budget requests hearing will be on September 13 at the City-County Building in the newly remodeled chambers. It is important to hear from as many constituents as possible on programs and services that you believe need to be kept, strengthened or eliminated.

The board has also been looking at long and short term solutions to the issue of homelessness. We are looking at temporarily using county facilities and a few parks. I support this effort in general, and the Public Works & Transportation Committee (PWT) voted unanimously to explore using some areas of the Alliant Energy Center for homeless folks, when there are no events scheduled at the facilities. However, I do not look at this as a long term solution. The committee also added in an amendment that there would be a deadline to present a permanent solution by March 2013. There is a homeless issues committee that is looking at solutions utilizing private and other municipal partners.

The board also adopted a youth mentoring program this term. Two high school students have been assigned to each county standing committee, after a selection process earlier this year. I am a mentor for one of the students assigned to the PWT. It is a great way of engaging and teaching young people who are interested in local government to be part of the civic process.

I was recently hired as housing organizer for SW Madison (approximately the Toki attendance area). My position is funded thanks to a 2-year grant from Orchard Ridge United Church of Christ and is aimed at addressing homelessness, mobility, and family stability. The idea was developed by the SW Housing Partnership, an active collaboration of Common Wealth Development, Madison and Dane Public Health, Joining Forces for Families, and Orchard Ridge U.C.C. Goals are to create an accessible *Housing Services Center* and enhance community stability in this area which contains many mobile families.

I am excited to get to know the larger Meadowood community. In the coming months, I will be focused on listening to the concerns, ideas, and plans of residents of how to apply community assets to issues in the neighborhoods. I am interested in hearing from anyone who would like to be involved in this effort, has ideas or suggestions or has any questions about my position. My core focus is to create a collaborative effort, grounded by residents and other interested parties on the SW-side. All are welcome and, more importantly, needed, as it is clear that our best chance to progress is to work together towards common goals. MPD Gang Activity Presentation , August 27, 2012

Shane Olson and Lester Moore, officers with the MPD's Crime Prevention Gang Unit, presented information, including a power point presentation on local gangs to the approximately 100 neighbors in attendance at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, a big thank you to the church. We learned what gangs were in Madison and its environs, saw gang symbols and signs, and their behaviors. It is not against the law to be a gang member. Like everyone else, it is against the law when a gang member participates in criminal behavior. But the presence of gangs goes hand in hand with certain criminal activities such as drug dealing and retail theft. We also learned that resources are stretched and that the Madison Police Department and Dane County Sheriff's Office are tackling this issue through education, prevention, intervention and enforcement but that they also need the help of those in the community...in other words you and me.

Take-Aways (or What I Learned I Can Do)

Report! Report! Report!

If you see gang graffiti or suspect gang graffiti contact the MPD/City of Madison. By removing graffiti immediately you remove the gang brand from the neighborhood. Gang graffiti is one way of marking territory. A former MNA board member who lived on Russett Road routinely and aggressively reported gang graffiti on that street and it was effective.

Suspected criminal gang activity, drug deals, and the like should always be reported! Even if the police cannot respond it is important for them to have the data.

Captain Vic Wahl was also present and encouraged residents to report incidents. He also noted that this was a community problem that was not going to be solved solely by police enforcement but needed to be addressed by our policy

makers, social service agencies, schools and residents.

Dear Meadowood Neighbors,



I hope you all have had a wonderful summer and managed to survive the heat waves. I was able to spend some time away from Madison and relax with my family, but overall it has been a busy summer both here in our neighborhood and at City Hall. I spent a lot of my time working on what I believe is the

neighborhood's number one issue: sustainability. By that I mean, sustaining Meadowood as the safe, affordable and attractive neighborhood that it has been and can continue to be! As I'm sure you are aware, we have had our challenges this summer; primarily in the form of criminal activity by a relatively small group of individuals. But I know we stand together in our belief that violence of any kind is not acceptable and we will work together to minimize that activity.

The question then becomes...how do we do that? And this is where we may have some disagreements. I've heard from many of you with opinions on how to improve neighborhood safety and I appreciate your emails and phone calls. We have many thoughtful and dedicated people in Meadowood and I truly value the concerns and suggestions I hear from so many of you. I continue to believe that to make our community safer we need to have a comprehensive approach to neighborhood improvement that specifically focuses on bottom-up organizing and empowement. We need services such as community centers and to involve police, public health nurses, County social services, building inspection, traffic engineering and most importantly, engaged Meadowood residents willing to stand up for our neighborhood, in order to create a sustainable community.

I think it is also important to point out that our efforts will take time and there will be bumps along the road. However, if we keep focused on the fact that we all want the same outcomes — safe streets and a good quality of life — we can achieve our goals.

Here is what I have been involved with in our district this summer:

Police -- I have kept a close relationship with the police department, specifically our Captain, Vic Wahl and Lieutenant, John Patterson as well as our neighborhood officers. As always, the police are doing their best to patrol the neighborhood and make arrests of the people who are causing harm. In addition and, in part, due to the Southwest Safety Initiative I co-sponsored in the 2012 budget, the department has stepped up its efforts by focusing on certain blocks and buildings where many of the problems arise from. Specifically, the police have begun to engage and/or pressure landlords who own properties that have unusually high numbers of calls for service. The goal is to work with these

landlords to help them get rid of the tenants or guests engaged in illegal activity. If there isn't cooperation from the landlord, the City will move to hold him or her accountable. The police have also been working to identify the youth who are involved with drug and gang activity and engage them and their parents in the hopes of reaching them before it's too late.

Hammersley/Theresa Terrace - I have spent a lot of time working in this neighborhood. Even though it isn't in Meadowood, the ramifications of letting the problems go unabated would be felt throughout southwest Madison. I have been meeting regularly with a group of residents in the neighborhood who decided they were fed up with what was happening and wanted to make a difference. I helped them get a street use permit that has allowed them to block off Theresa Terrace to traffic every Monday this summer so they could have activities for the many young people living the area who have too few options to keep them occupied. We are now working to achieve their long range goal which is to have a community gathering space located in their neighborhood. The prospects are very promising! Even though there is a lot more to do, the work being done in that area of town is an excellent example of bottom-up organizing and of the value of neighborhood/City partnerships.

Traffic -- The City's traffic engineer and I have gotten to know each other quite well this summer! We have worked together with residents to make improvements in several areas in the district; including adding a stop sign near Heugel School and continuing to educate people pedestrians and drivers about the proper use of the intersection of Raymond Rd. and Leland Dr.

Meet and Eat – Many of you know about and have even enjoyed a meal from one of the food carts at a "Meet and Eat" this summer. For those of you who haven't heard, the Mayor and I and members of our dedicated City staff organized an event in which a dozen or so ethnic food carts set up in the vacant lot next to the Meadowood Shopping Center on Raymond Rd. We've had such great success with the event that it was extended into September. There will be two more this year, September 6th and 20th from 5-7:30 pm. I hope to see you there! If you want to learn more, go to the City's website and type in "Meet and Eat" in the search engine.

City wide issues--Budget season – Chances are by the time you are reading this the Mayor will have introduced his capital budget and soon he will introduce the City's operating budget for 2013. It will be another challenging budget as levy limits mandated by the state take effect and costs go up. Given that reality, I and my colleagues on the Council will do our best to maintain services at the level we expect and deserve. For more information about the City budget process go to the City's website and scroll down until you see "City Budget" and click on it.

Education - In June, I assumed the chair of the newly

reconfigured education committee. The committee is made up of two alders, two county board supervisors and two members of the Board of Education as well as a designee of the Mayor's and the MMSD superintendent's offices. As I have been emphasizing for a while now, I believe the City (and County) has the responsibility to partner strongly with the public schools. It's a tired cliché but so true: our community is only as strong as our public schools and the students we produce. As chair, my vision for the committee is that through diligence, cooperation, and research we will come up with a strong and meaningful community initiative that helps the school district close the achievement gap. We don't know what that will be yet, but I look forward to working with my colleagues to find out!

These are really just a few of the issues I have been working on lately, so if you have any questions on these or other topics that are concerning you, as always, please contact me. Otherwise, enjoy the beginning of fall, school (kids are out of the house!) and football season!

Transit Corridor Study Public Meeting Monday, September 10, 2012, 6 to 8 p.m. Madison Senior Center, 330 West Mifflin Street

The Madison Area Transportation Planning Board, in cooperation with Metro Transit and the Capital Area Regional Planning Commission (CARPC), is leading a study to explore where and how to implement a Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) system in the Madison metropolitan area. The study is part of the Capital Region Sustainable Communities (CRSC) Initiative

led by CARPC.

BRT is a high-frequency, limited-stop service that offers improved customer experience on busy transit corridors. Faster service is accomplished by speeding passenger boarding, transit priority at traffic signals, and express service. Station improvements, information technology, improved service reliability and vehicle comfort create a more user-friendly experience.

Please join planning staff and the consultant team at a public meeting on September 10 to learn more about BRT and provide your input on what you want from a Madison- area BRT system.

Pedestrian/Bicycle Ambassador Pilot Program

This month marks the start of a pilot program whose mission is to improve our quality of life in Madison. The Pedestrian/Bicycle Ambassador Program seeks to educate our pedestrian and bicycling communities on applicable laws and best practices when navigating the City. Ambassadors have already been working in the community, attending events such as National Night Out, Ride the Drive and Ethnic Fest. They have connected with neighborhoods through events such as the graduation ceremonies for Latino and Black Youth Academies and the recent Meadowood Meet and Eat evenings. Ambassadors will be working with youth at schools, sharing the message of safety.

I am proud to have the caliber of our two ambassadors, Zachary Barnes and Jennifer Laack. Zachary and Jennifer are committed to making Madison the best it can be and truly understand the needs of our pedestrian and bicycling communities. If you see them out and about, please welcome them!

Zachary is a relatively new full-time Madisonian though he has worked and lived throughout Wisconsin over the last nine years. He is a car-free resident, owning three bikes (one self-built out of bamboo) which serve as his primary mode of transportation. He enjoys empowering others while becoming more mindful in commuting and recreating. Fluent in Spanish, he listens (and dances) to La Movida and WORT Community Radio. He calls the near eastside home where he enjoys playing kubb, meeting neighbors, cooking and dreaming up a plan for an around-the-world bike tour.

Jennifer is a returned Madisonian and has lived here the last five years. She enjoys all things outdoors especially biking and walking (of course), jogging, kayaking, canoeing, ice skating and skiing. She lives just beyond the near eastside and enjoys how easily she can travel by bicycle. She promotes cycling as a great first mode of transportation. Jennifer lives with her husband and will be adopting another rescued Rottweiler.

Madison Water Utility: Project H2O

Madison Water Utility has begun installing new meter reading technology in every home and business in the city. This "Project H2O" will automate water meter reading capabilities through a fixed-base radio network to increase accuracy and provide customers with the timely information they need to better manage their water usage.

According to MWU General Manager Tom Heikkinen, "Our current Read-o-Matic meter registers, first introduced to the market in 1958, are obsolete and no longer being supported by the manufacturer, so this technology implementation is necessary. It will be a catalyst for significant improvements in water efficiency and customer service." Similar meter systems are already in use in Milwaukee and are common throughout the country.

When installations are complete, customers will be able to monitor their daily water usage online and sign up for leak alerts through an iOS or Android app. Measuring system water loss more accurately will enable MWU to optimize infrastructure improvements and future capacity planning. The new system will also enable the utility to switch from a six-month billing cycle to the more common monthly billing that most other utilities use. Usage will be shown in gallons rather than cubic feet, making bills easier to understand.
